Discover a better way to support the well-being of families, children, youth, and young adults served by the child welfare system and effectively break the cycle of generational trauma.

2) The Trouble With Trauma

It's important for us to understand the lingering effects of childhood trauma so we can better create pathways to healing for vulnerable children and teens.

We cannot heal what we cannot acknowledge; we're going to explore some foundational components in childhood trauma so we can better create solutions that facilitate healing for children and teens.

3) Connections That Heal

Yes, connections heal trauma. But not just any connections; sustained, meaningful, committed connections: What we call relational permanency, Getting Kids Connected, and Keeping Kids Connected is our mission.









Learning Objectives:

Show the significance of relationships:

- Examine and explain the central role that relationships play in human development, as emphasized by experts like Peter Benson and Dr. Dan Siegel.
- Explain how connections with family, friends, and others contribute to the shaping of neural connections and overall well-being.

Examine the impact of attachment on brain development:
